## PURPOSE OF BUSINESS PLAN SUMMARY

The Map Modernization Management Support (MMMS) Business Plan Summary was compiled by reviewing the Federal Fiscal Year (FY) 2005-09 MMMS Business Plans and FY06 updates from the business plans submitted to the Department of Homeland Security's Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). The business plan summary highlights the proposed and completed MMMS activities that each FEMA MMMS Partner has undertaken, presents how the FEMA Regional Office allocated its funding from FEMA Headquarters to each State in Federal FY05, and identifies risk factors that may have impacted the FEMA MMMS Partner's resources. All of these categories are shown in relation to the Flood Map Modernization mapping schedule.

## STATE VISION FOR MAP MODERNIZATION AND IMPLEMENTATION

The District of Columbia's Emergency Management Agency's (EMA's) plan outlines the strategy for securing future funds to develop the capability and capacity for managing the modernization effort for the City of Washington, D.C. Formation of this plan represents the commitment of the District Government to assume a larger

role in implementing Map Modernization. Also, this plan documents the collaborative efforts of the District and its partners to implement specific activities supporting the development of new mapping products.

Map Modernization includes an integrated partnership of multiple Federal and District agencies that contribute to the development of various projects. The ultimate goal is to devolve floodplain mapping from FEMA to States, territories and localities having the interest and willingness to develop the required capability to support State-level administration of the program.

The District intends to implement the program utilizing resources such as interagency partnerships, EMA resources, Department of Health (DOH) resources and the Office of the Chief Technology Officer resources.

## SIGNIFICANT ACCOMPLISHMENTS AND STRENGTHS OR SUCCESS STORIES

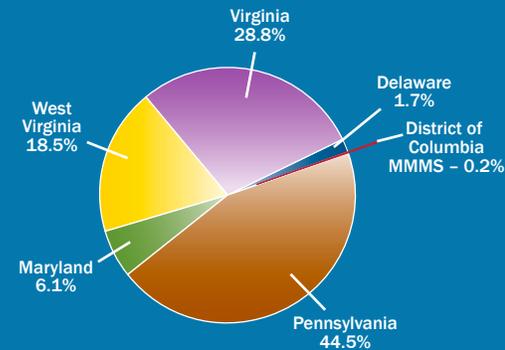
The EMA and DOH promote the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) by conducting and/or participating in community events. During these events, the agencies distribute FEMA and State-developed literature; conduct orientations, exhibits, workshops and seminars to provide detailed information concerning protective measures that significantly reduce or eliminate the impact of future hazards on lives and property; promote NFIP/flood insurance; and provide details on FEMA hazard mitigation programs.

The FY04 annual budget report for the EMA reflects the following measures that support the NFIP and Map Modernization:

- Identify and prioritize by cost reduction measures, 18 potential hazards that adversely threaten or impact the District of Columbia;
